

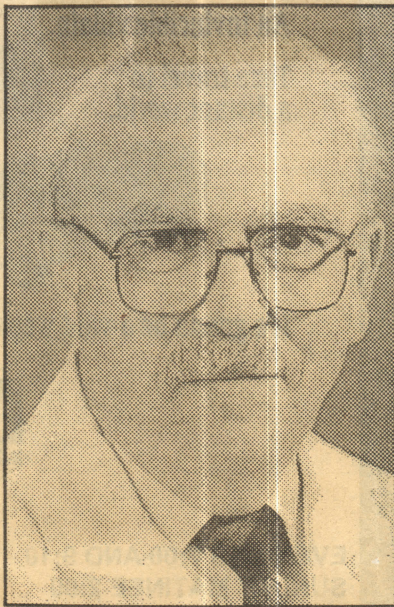

Six Saskatchewan residents, including a Saskatoon doctor known as "the father of 9-1-1," deserve a hearty pat on the back. They'll receive the Saskatchewan Order of Merit for "individual excellence and outstanding contributions to the social, economic and cultural well-being of the province and its residents."

The Saskatoon recipient, **Dr. Louis Horlick**, is an authority on cardiology and cholesterol who's contributed to the understanding and prevention of heart disease

The cardiologist working at Royal University Hospital and the University of Saskatchewan also played a contributing role in the introduction of the emergency 9-1-

Other recipients of the 1991 order are: Regina's **Frederick W. Johnson**, a former chief justice and lieutenant-governor; **Annie Johnstone** of Pinehouse, a long-serving northern Saskatchewan midwife; **Emmie Oddie** of Regina, a home economist, leader in rural women's organizations and Western Producer columnist; **Dr. Ronald DePauw**, a research scientist and plant breeder from Swift Current; and **Yvonne Hassett**, a Maple Creek resident who volunteers her time to work with cancer patients.

They'll receive Saskatchewan's highest honor from Lt.-Gov. Sylvia Fedoruk Nov. 25 in Saskatoon.

This ceremony brings to 40 the people appointed to the order since its introduction in 1985.
